


Jax, a recent adoptee, "working". AKA soaking up the love & attention!



Abby was our little girl with skin issues who's off to her new home with a retired lady in Didsubry.




Jax and Opie went to a foster home – and are staying put! The couple recently lost their dog and are excited to have dogs again.

We had just finished fostering a spunky little pup that we had originally considered adopting, but unfortunately that little lady had a big fixation with the cats in our home that we couldn't break. Then Tom called us about someone wanting to surrender a dog that was great with cats and close to Hanna, and that it was actually a friend of mine! It took some convincing to give her dog to us as a foster, since she wasn't quite sure how she would feel about seeing her around town. Luckily, she agreed!

Enter Miss Daphne!


When we first met Daphne, she was VERY timid and unsure of what was happening. It was a few hours of quiet time and laying next to her open crate to get her to come out and meet us. Our older dogs helped a lot, showing her by example that we are nice people.

It took a long time, probably 5 months, for her to not submissive pee 3+ times during the day. Any time we would reach down (not even really for her, just to pick something up beside her) she would cower and pee. Even taping the couch inviting her up would trigger her peeing. She's come SO far in that way! She still pees when we are putting her harness on, but knowing that, we do it outside.

From day one, she's been such an amazingly patient and loving little lady with our 2 little boys (ages 2 & 6). They've snuggled her and pet her (almost too much) and she's NEVER showed any aggression, it's so touching to see.

The hardest part about adding another fur-baby to our home besides the kids, are the other animals (2 dogs-2 cats). It was very important that they could live in harmony. Which is exactly how it's been with Daphne, she's had no issues joining our little wiener pack, and has been snuggling with them and even the cats(!) since day one.

My life with canine Systemic Lupus Erythematosus

Hi, my name is Opie. I have Canine Systemic Lupus Erythematosus (SLE), canine lupus. To start with, a little about myself and my life.

My first two years were awful, I had an abusive owner, I tried to run as did some of my brothers and sisters, but they were shot trying to escape. I was one of the lucky ones, I was rescued, removed from my terrible home, taken far away from my horrible owner and life began to be very good. I was placed with great foster parents who fell in love with me, then adopted me. It took a while for me to allow the love of hugs instead of the fear of violence. Life became glorious but then something strange started to happen. My eyes became very sore, red and one eyeball would swell up along with an off-on fever. Then slowly my back leg became stiff, sore, painful so I started to lift it, using only three legs. My parents were very concerned so the trips to a canine University medical office, a couple of hours away, began and continued for over a year with many, many tests. Then it was confirmed I had SLE – or Lupus, for short.

SLE is an immune disease where the immune system starts to attack the body's cells and tissue. Depending on which organs are affected, it can be quite deadly. There were more trips over time to experiment on medications and dosage, then FINALLY a combination of pills, ointment and drops that worked. Thank goodness my parents loved me and were able to take the time do that for me. All was good for many months. The Doctors said my eyes would always be very sensitive to bright sunlight with flare ups of my eyeball swelling. Also, my hind end would forever be fragile with flare ups of stiffness, pain and on-off fevers, but I could live a long life even though Lupus is permanent, there is no cure. They explained to me that the real causes of Lupus are still not well understood, even today. There is likely a genetic component and exposure to ultraviolet light, stress, medication and viral infections all contribute to the condition. Myself, I think it was from my horrific first two years.

Now my life depends on my parents. They must take very special care to give me medication four times a day and keep my life as stress-free as possible. This medication is very expensive, approximately \$320.00 a month, but without it I would not live long and would die a very painful death. Since SLE is an immune disease all treats and food must be hypoallergenic. This of course costs more than regular food. In addition, every six months I need an exam with a Veterinary Eye Specialist. I am thankful that my adoptive parents obtained medical insurance for me when they adopted me.

Unfortunately, my adoptive family had to make a painful decision of surrendering me to ADR due to changes in their life. As you can see by all they did for me this decision was very difficult for them, but they said it was best for me. I was brought to Edmonton where I was placed in a temporary foster home and I was very

sad, frightened, stressed out and could not understand what was happening or why it was happening. My foster Dad was great, and he really helped me feel comfortable in my strange new surroundings.

At the same time a tragedy was unfolding in the city of St. Albert. A retired lady living alone on Old Age Pension was making a very painful and difficult decision to have her fur baby of 16 years Zoey euthanized because Zoey was in tremendous pain resulting from a spinal stroke. The decision was made, and her mom went home in grief and sorrow. In the next weeks the heartbreak, anguish and loneliness was so overwhelming she decided to contact ADR and they told her about ME! OPIE! She took a leap of faith, met me and brought me home with her.

She is now my new mom and takes very good care of me. However, medication four times a day, proper food & treats, Dr.'s exams, medical insurance payments (which turned out to be higher in Alberta), medication costs not covered, and deductibles ended up being more than originally anticipated. I have bonded with my new mom, I really need her, she really needs me, I want to stay with her and she wants me to stay. I am convinced it is very important for us to remain together. To help I have decided to share my story in hopes of any little bit of financial help, no matter how small a donation, so we can stay together. Thank you." Opie
